Sporting:

<u>STEM:</u>

Longest flight time Water Rocketsstudents compete for the longest time in air for a water compression rocket using bike pumps. Winner will be the longest time per group competition.

Building Structures competition (using Spaghetti)- Students using materials (to be determined based on funding/ preparation) such as spaghetti, popsicles, straws, etc and building the compressed ar tallest building outdoors in groups.

The Egg Drop- Students design, build, and test a way of Dropping an Egg from height without breaking it.

Throughout this term, the Senior boys have been participating in a three match series of cricket against Cunderdin Agricultural College. All three games were closely contested and all were won by less than 6 runs.

In game 1, NSHS was sent into bat first and scored a competitive total of 5/137 from our 20 overs, with Jack Parmenter scoring 67 from 57 deliveries. Unfortunately Cunderdin were able to chase down the total, scoring the winning run off the last ball of the innings. Kayne Gorbig finished with figures of 2/17 off his 4 overs and Fletcher Page managed 2/18 off his 3 overs.

Game 2, NSHS were once again sent in to bat first. Runs were hard to come by and we only managed to set a total of 7/106 from our 20 overs. Glen Podmore top scored with 34 from 42 deliveries. Cunderdin were cruising along at 4/96 after 13 overs and looked set to win Game 2. In the next 2.4 overs NSHS managed to take 6/5 and snatch victory away from Cunderdin. Kane O'Driscoll finished with figures of 3/3 off 1.4 overs, Jack Parmenter took 3/12 off 2 overs and Glen Podmore took 3/23 off 3 overs.

In the final game of the series, NSHS won the toss and chose to field first. Cunderdin scored 6/109 off their 20 overs. Cody Gorbig and Fletcher Page both finished with figures of 2/18 off 4 overs. The run chase came down to the last two balls. NSHS required 3 runs from 2 balls when Kane O'Driscoll hit a six to secure the victory. NSHS ended up winning by 1 wicket with Kayne Gorbig top scoring with 33 from 31 deliveries.

All three games were played with fantastic sportsmanship from both schools with great cricket skills displayed. Well done to all the boys who participated and I look forward to seeing another successful series in 2022.

Anyone who decides to stroll down past room 10 will notice our welcome wagon rolled out (or, rather, posted on the door) not only in Italian but in many other languages that may be recognised by speakers of a second language at Northam SHS, including French, Noongar, Māori and Tagalog. Although Italian is the language being taught in Room 10, all languages are recognised, welcomed and embraced, in order to give a true sense of the multiculturalism and diversity that is embodied at NSHS.

Moving forward in the year, Term 2 will see the beginning of our Italian Cards Club.
